

Jim Wood, WHY KNOT (32-006) reports that the latches may be found at ACE Hardware. They're listed as "screen door" latches.

Carey Cook, LEE-LOO (32-138) has prepared fairly detailed check lists for commissioning, getting underway, and winterizing his tug. He is also working on preparing a diagram showing the location of all of the thru-hulls, vents, and such on his tug. Jim & Mim McCrea, NORTH STAR (37-134) have modified the helm seating on their tug to remove the sliding bench seat and now have a Stidd "Slimline Admiral" seat on a floor mounted pedestal in its place. The benefits are better visibility due to a little higher seating position, ability to reach the controls while still having a back rest, and now, arm rests, as well as a foot rest integral to the chair. Rechargeable Batteries

John Scarborough, RIVERDANCE (32-209) sent me a note that he recently had the battery on his portable VHF radio rebuilt and upgraded by Primecell, a company in Pennsylvania. They were reasonable and fast. Check out their website at www.primecell.com

editor's follow-up on above: Based on John's comments, I sent Prinecell two battery packs (from two very old Apelco hand held VHF radios) that had "died" many years ago. I didn't have the heart to throw the radios away even though the batteries would no longer hold a charge. The two old packs were upgraded from NiCd to NiMh with greater AH capacity and overcharge protection at a cost that was less than the purchase price of one new Apelco battery pack or the least expensive new hand-held VHF radio. Turn around time was 18 days from Washington to Pennsylvania and back to Washington. Great service at a great price.



Northeast Nordic Tug Owners' Association Rendezvous

It seems it was just yesterday a handful of tuggers got together at what turned out to be our 1st NENTOA rendezvous. This year was our 7th! Tuggers from 12 states and the Turks & Caicos spent three wonderful days talkin' tugs, meeting old friends, and making new acquaintances.

The weather cooperated, too, making our three-day event most pleasant indeed. We congregated in the historic Connecticut River Valley town of Essex - with its picturesque Main Street looking much as it did in the late 1700s when shipbuilding was the mainstay of life in the small town.

Our rendezvous began on Wednesday, July 25, with 19 tugs chugging into Essex Island Marina. Thirteen tugs were in nearby marinas. Nine crews came without their boats. Tuggers came from Maine, Vermont, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New York, Maryland, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, California, and the Turks & Caicos.

We had three wonderful days together, with lots of social time intermixed with seminars and presentations.

The rum party and the potluck dinner was followed by a brief association business meeting. George Bevad was elected Commodore for the 2007-08 year; the team of Dick & Mable Seymour and Newell & Marilyn Sly will fill the Vice Commodore position. The evening's entertainment began with a delightful dialog between ventriloguist Burt

Prater and his friend Road Kill. Dick Seymour (Sea Mischief III, 42-090) showed slideshows of the aircraft carrier Intrepid and the rose show at New York's Bronx Botanical Gardens, and Ruth Jansson & Bette Conner (Annie B, 32-172) showed the second half of their movie-Cruising the Inland Waterways-from Ottawa, Canada, to Connecticut via Montreal, the St. Lawrence Seaway, and Lake Champlain.

Thursday - rise and shine. Breakfast at 8 - welcomes by Commodore George, our friend and dealer Ben Wilde, and Nordic Tug's Bob Shamek. Bob talked about the latest from the factory and showed the group a slide show of the soon-to-be newest addition to the Nordic Tug fleet - the NT49. Norm Philips (Spray, 37-139) presented a short movie of a NT 37 making a circle turn, then making the same circle turn after the installation of an articulating rudder. John Baczek (Puffin, 32-266) showed a step-by-step slideshow explaining how he filled in the chine to eliminate the bow slap that bothers so many tuggers.

Two sessions of hour-long seminars followed: Nordic Tugs, Cummins, Insurance, Best Tug Add-Ons, Healthy Galley for Two, Chart Plotter Demo & Tips, and Medical Issues Afloat.

Nothing was scheduled for the entire afternoon, allowing time to visit, read, rest, swim, or stroll the quaint streets and shops in town. At 5:30 the tuggers gathered at the cocktail lounge of the nearby Essex Yacht Club where trays of hors d'oeuvres were abundant. Tuggers bought miles of raffle tickets with high expectations, swelling our coffers and once again eliminating

I think it is an ounce of Rain-X to a gallon of water. Really helps keep the salt from cruding the glass. It's available at Wal-Mart stores' auto dept. Beats the heck out of the "rub on" style Rain-X.

Odds & Ends

Jim Moore, RILEY, 37-085, reports: When anchoring our 37, I always felt comfortable with available battery capacity and took no pains to reduce 12v loads overnight. Actually, I felt it was beneficial to deep cycle batteries to give them a little exercise. With anchor light on, house lights, fridge, interior step lights for safety, LPG regulator, etc., I always felt that starting the generator first thing would ensure satisfactory battery reserve to begin the day, notwithstanding the inverter remote always

showed the battery state as mid-range or on rare ocassions in the "red" zone.

On a recent morning, with the genset running to top off batteries and power the reverse cycle heaters, main diesel running, I started the windlass to weigh anchor. When I released the switch momentarily to wash down the anchor chain the windlass did not stop. I tapped the foot switch a couple times and it kept running. Doesn't take long to realize you have a problem. I ducked back in the wheelhouse, switched off the windlass breaker on the 12v panel and it kept running so I charged down the steps to switch off the breaker on the starboard side of the bunk and it stopped. My wife and I managed to retrieve the anchor with her operating the breaker and me tapping my foot on the deck to indicate start/stop.

I called Dan Hilsinger at Nordic Tugs and he said it was either the windlass controller or a brush "hung up" on the windlass motor. He referred me to Imtra and I explained my problem to the Imtra tech. He started out by saying if battery voltage is low it can cause the contacts in the controller to weld together. notwithstanding the alternator on the main diesel and the charger in the inverter, powered by the genset were in operation. Pretty well described my situation so when at a dock I went back under the bunk (after disconnecting the fwd battery cables), removed the controller, disassembled it and, voila, the contacts had welded together. They came apart readily (actually while I was disassembling it) and I reversed the moveable contact so the welds did not mate, reassembled it and everything worked fine. Imtra tech had said the surface imperfection around the weld would probably cause it to happen again so I did order a new controller.

Lesson learned; when at anchor, switch off all but necessary 12v loads, top off the batteries as late as possible, and bring the batteries up to full voltage in the morning before operating the windlass. You'd probably do well to order

We also have new export markets in the early development stages in Australia and New Zealand. These should become real in the next few months.


Another major project this year has been the completion of 2 new buildings:




