Interior Teak Maintanance

Bob Shamek from the NT Factory reports: For a new part I would apply 3 coats of t

For a new part I would apply 3 coats of teak oil. We use Dalys Seafin teak oil. West Marine sells it. Wet sand teak with 320 grit and teak oil let stand for 5 to ten minutes wipe off excess teak oil then let dry. Repeat using 500 grit then 800 or 1000 grit wipe clean after each sanding. If you do not wipe excess oil off completely you will need to sand it out another time. After the oil dries you can buff the finish for higher gloss. Drying time will vary with temperature and humidity. Just make sure you let it dry between coats. New teak will never look like your original teak until it fades out if it is darker. If it is lighter it will always be lighter as teak lightens in sun light. If anyone has further question drop me a note at: bobs@nordictugs.com

DC ELECTRICAL PARTS

Peter Shaughnessy, Invictus 32-101, reports good mail-order service and good prices for electrical parts from a company in Georgia: http://shop.genuinedealz.com/

Herb Nickles, Snorri, 32-225 notes that while most OEM DC electrical parts (panels, breakers, terminal blocks, etc) are from Blue Seas, tuggers can purchase similar products from Radio Shack. Nordic Tugs if you can't locate any in your area. The pins and plugs require a special crimp tool."

Storage Solutions

Linda Vanaman, MERCY, 37-057 has a suggestion if you are one of those types who store supplies under the cockpit, or even aft of the transom on the 37/39's:

Rubbermaid Commercial Products makes a "Heavy Duty Bus Box" (as in clearing restaurant tables) that are heavy duty gray plastic containers that measure approx. 21" x 17" x 7" at the top, slightly less on the bottom. They fit PERFECTLY between the stringers! I keep bleach, soap products, engine oil, lines, and misc spare parts stored under the deck, prevented from shifting or spilling by these containers. I bought mine in 2-pks from Sam's Wholesale Club in their restaurant items department, though I'm sure you can find them from multiple vendors.
